

## DEPARTMENT 14 — FRUITS AND NUTS

1. In selecting fruit for exhibition, choose specimens that would bring the highest market price. Do not select the largest, select medium size. In plate displays, select five specimens as nearly alike as possible. Stems must be attached to all fruit.
2. The following score is to be used as a basis for judging of all exhibits:
 

Form (natural shape of variety)	10 points
Size (medium for variety)	15 points
Color	20 points
Uniformity	25 points
Freedom from blemishes	<u>30 points</u>
<b>TOTAL</b>	<b>100 points</b>
3. Each exhibitor must designate the particular premium for which he is competing and see that the packages are properly tagged.
4. Premiums will be awarded only when the exhibit complies with the standard, is meritorious, and is properly named.
5. Premiums will be paid for only the varieties listed for each class. Any other varieties will be judged against each other in one subclass.
6. Due to limited space, only one entry per class per exhibitor will be accepted.
7. Plates for displays will be provided.
8. Classes 101-700 must display five of each item.
9. Exhibits will be disposed of by the fair at 10 p.m. Saturday, Aug. 26 unless otherwise specified by the exhibitor at the time of entry.
